he Metropolitan Black Bar Association (MBBA) hed its annual gala last month, "IMPACTING Our Profession, IMPACTING Our Community," was the theme with Midwin Charles and Joey Jackson (both Attorneys at Law), serving as co-emcees for the evening.

As MBBA President, Paula T. Edgar, Esq. recounts, "This year's gala was a celebration of the impact of black lawyers and the need for more intentional efforts to foster diversity in the legal profession. We made a deliberate decision to honor a slate of all women honorees to highlight the need for greater gender parity, equity and inclusion."

The gala raised over \$350,000 for the organization. The funds raised are used to advance the MB-BA's membership and mission.

# The Secret to Success for All Students Is Parental and Community Engagement

**T**he National Family Engagement Summit of 2018 was held in Richmond, Va. Throughout the summit, multiple opportunities were provided for attendees to interact with some of the nation's leading experts in parent and family engagement. Participants came from near and far. Over 300 teachers, parents, administrators, and community activists participated, presented, networked, taught and learned strategies to increase family engagement. One presenter described the difference between involvement and engagement as the level of commitment, stating, "It's like you've got a ring on it! You're not just passively attending a few parent-teacher meetings, but you're planning, making decisions, running for the school board and more."

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), speaks specifically to parent and family engagement. Data highlighted examples of the successful impact parents can have when they are present in their child's school. One presenter pointed out that, "Parents tend to be extremely involved with students in the early elementary grades. They bring them to school,



speak with the teacher frequently, and are more likely to volunteer for field trips, classroom activities, and attend parent-teacher meetings." However, around the third grade, parents start to reduce their involvement. They attend fewer meetings, volunteer for field-trips and other events less, and seldom spend time in the building. In some cases, they may have only met the teacher just once.

When students reach third grade and began to socialize more independently with friends, parent engagement often wanes. It's not surprising that after requiring almost, constant supervision that parents breathe a sigh of relief when their children gain newfound independence. However, these are the times when our children require increased attention, specifically our young Black males. There is significant data to show a correlation between K-12 completion, literacy, and adulthood incarceration. The NAACP reported that African Americans are incarcerated at more than five times the rate of Whites and, nationwide, African American children represent 32 percent of children who are arrested. Blacks make up just 13 percent of the U.S. population. Patterns, such as, absenteeism, delinquent behavior, and academic apathy, correlate with high suspension rates and subsequent incarceration.

ESSA places increased

priority on parental engagement and requires states to provide innovative strategies to incorporate parental and family engagement into a school's decision-making, and planning. ESSA stresses two-way communication. This requires teachers, and administrators to reach out to parents in clear, concise, relatable ways that encourage feed-back and input at every level of implementation. Some non-traditional communication strategies include social media use, e-newsletters, and short surveys. Administrators and teachers are encouraged to schedule meetings that accommodate parents with different hours of availability.

ESSA does not dictate the ways in which schools are required to engage parents. However, educators should recognize the crucial role

parental partnerships play in preparing students for college and careers.

This summer, the National Newspaper Publishers Association will host its second National Black Parents' Town Hall Meeting on Educational Excellence. The conversation on parent engagement will continue at the Gethsemane Community Fellowship Church on Tuesday, June 26th, from 6pm - 9pm ETS. This event will be livestreamed and for the first time, NNPA ESSA will host two viewing rooms in California-one in Los Angeles, and the other in San Francisco. If you are not able to join us in Norfolk, Va., you should certainly make your way to the viewing rooms in California or join the livestream online.

I'm guessing by now you're saying what's the point of trying to buy a home? Home values are too high. The banks are too conservative with their lending practices. The whole home buying process seems to be just a big headache, why even bother?

"Got a gentle heart and a lion's soul. Got the will to give me everything he can. But what he really got is a gift. Sometimes he play, I think he's talkin' to God and together they answerin' my prayers"

P-Sam (Francois Batiste
- Obie Award-winner, Head of
Passes) is the frustrated percussionist, always hustling for
his next gig. He's suspicious
of Blue...worried he's plotting

something...maybe selling the club and leave them jobless?

SILVER (Simone Missick - Luke Cage) is the mysterious, sexy, strong minded lady with a past who moves like a spider weaving a web. She moves into the 'room for rent' at Paradise. But why? "Time to pick up somewhere new. I heard of this strip in Paradise Valley where folks got all they own business. If it's somewhere that Colored folks is doing more than sharecroppin' and reapin' White folks harvest... I ought to be there. I'm here so I can get a taste of all that.'

Blue does not like her because she perceives his demons "My Daddy had 'em in him. Husband too. Them feelins of bein' trapped by yo' skin... Turns you mad. Only place you got to escape is that horn, ain't it? But you ain't gonna get rid of 'em. They gon' get rid of you. Less you make amends".

# Summertime Fun @ Sugar Hill Children's Museum

n your list of summertime activities consider adding the Sugar Hill Children's Museum of Art and Storytelling, where you will find interactive art exhibits, weekly storytelling, monthly jazz and world music performances, as well as a summer camp for children where creativity will be stimulated through using light itself as a medium.

The Sugar Hill Museum, located on St. Nicholas Avenue at 155th Street, is housed in a tall charcoal grey building designed by David Adjaye, the architect of the National African American Museum of History and Culture in Washington, DC.

Jennifer Ifil-Ryan, the Deputy Director of Creative Engagement, has been working with her team to create programing at the museum that represents the diversity of the Harlem community it serves. In her role, Ryan identifies the reality of working in a community experiencing gentrification and puts her focus on developing Sugar Hill as a place for families that "creates dialogue across social and ethnic boundaries."

One way this manifests is through storytelling hour at the museum where storytellers share tales from around the world. The storytelling team thoughtfully chooses stories that promote global citizenship and teach compassion, while celebrating all different cultures. "It is important to acknowledge the political climate we are currently in, we have to be proactive about teaching and celebrating as many cultures as we can," said Ryan.

If you have more of a taste for music, this summer the museum will have outdoor music nights from 6 to 8pm every third Thursday of the month till September. "We take the music outside to invite everyone," said Ryan. There

are food trucks, artmaking and more on these nights, with the music starting around 6:45pm. On June 21, Latin Brazilian Jazz group *Annette Aguilar and the String Beans* will perform. Among the genres of music featured will be Swing, Latin and Afro-Dominican.

In partnership with the Jazz Foundation of America esteemed Jazz artist Marjorie Eliot will also be at the museums every third Thursday of the month sharing her musical gifts and knowledge of Jazz with children from 11am-12pm. Eliot is well known in Harlem for her Sunday salons where she opens her home to the community to share music and conversation.

The museum will also be running a summer camp for children ages 3 to 8 years old from July 9-July 27. The day is from 8am to 3pm and while snacks are provided, parents are responsible for

lunch. Parents have the option of signing their child up for all three weeks or just one. There will be artists and educators working with the children on activities like shadow puppetry, lantern making, and flashlight prints, a special technique used by Spanish artist Pablo Picasso. The camp is designed to be both educational and fun, "All the academic stuff, like science, literacy and engineering, is interwoven with the magical things when playing with light," Ryan said.

There is also a monthly "Play-date" on the third Sunday of every month when the museum is open to the community for free and families can enjoy the exhibits as well as activities like artmaking and storytelling.

Currently the exhibits up are "Jewel Bright: **Kaleidoscope of Neighborhood Gems**" and "Ana Mendieta: Thinking About Children's Thinking." The Jewel Bright

exhibit "celebrates the community behind the museum" said Ryan, showcasing important community members of Harlem in photography. "It is a nod of gratitude to the people who came before us and the impact they had on people of the community," she said.

As you walk into the Ana Mendieta exhibit you will hear the voices of children responding to a question posed by the artist: What is a soul? Mendieta was radical in her engagement of young children in philosophical questions often reserved for adults. Ryan expressed her own appreciation of Mendieta's foresight to engage children with these topics as a way to help children self-actualize and reflect on their inner power. "We are radiating beings of energy and we don't always think about how powerful and abled we are," she said.

On June 28 Sugar Hill will introduced two new exhibits, "Re-

lational Undercurrents: Contemporary Art of the Caribbean Archipelago," with recent artwork by more than 80 artists representing more than 12 Caribbean countries and "Leslie Jiménez, Catch the Light!," a collection of 3-D line drawings by the artist honoring the strength of women and caregivers in her life.

Sugar Hill held their first benefit "[press] PLAY" to raise money for the museum on June 13, which featured music by DJ J. Period, producer of the Hamilton Mixtape and honored filmmaker and curator Shola Lynch.

The infusion or tincture prepared with buchu is effective in treating UTIs when these conditions are associated with a previously existing problem of Candida, or other yeast infections, and as a douche for treating leucorrhea (a white vaginal discharge).

should never be taken during pregnancy; and juniper berries should not be taken when kidney infection is present.



# Note to Self collected and introduced by Gayle King

Pay attention.
Eyes forward, ears open. You've heard those things before in your life, and now you say them to yourself, your kids, and your employees. But do they hear what you say now... or, as in the new book "Note to Self," collected and introduced by Gayle King, will your words ring back in the future?

When she was just nine years old, a classmate told Gayle King that she would be his slave, were it not for Lincoln.

Stunned, she ran home to tell her mother, who comforted her with words King still remembers – but it made



King wonder what she, as the woman she is today, would tell that "skinny little nine-year-old girl..." if she could send her young self a message. In her Emmy-nominated series for CBS This Morning, she gives opportunities for others to do the similar.

Beginning with Oprah, King's best friend, there are words of comfort for a young woman who was dating the wrong man: "I use the word beautiful because... that's never a word you would call yourself."

Kermit the Frog admits that he's "green with envy" for the possibilities ahead for the frog he once was. Former Vice President Joe Biden advises his twelve-year-old self to look forward, because there's great adventure ahead. NFL player Ryan O'Callaghan advises his younger self to "Breathe." From Dr. Ruth, who was orphaned by the Nazis: "... your bravery will be reward-

ed."

Tyler Perry thanks his young self for thriving. Architect Frank Gehry says, "Once you find your passion... work your tail off..." John Lewis advises himself to always remember the words of Dr. King: "We must learn to live together as brothers or perish together as fools."

Surround yourself with those you love. Hug often. Examine your mistakes. Have fun. And remember that people can be "meaner or crueler or wetter or prettier... but they can't be more human than you."


If you could, would you become 18 years old again?

For most people, the answer is "yes," but only if they can take their knowl-

edge back with them. It's a moot point, of course – you can't, and you can't – but "Note to Self" sets forth an intriguing exercise.

It also offers a chance for reflection on a sleepy summer afternoon, too. There's a good mix of inspiring, gracious and grateful tales inside this book, from those with stardom already in-pocket, to a few that may not be household names quite yet. Some of the tales are exactly what you'd expect, while others may surprise you with candor and reasoning. TV Host and story collector Gayle King explains how she received these stories and others like them; she then lays down a few rules, and leaves blank pages for readers' own Notes to Self.

This is not a difficult book to read. With its short,



quick chapters, it practically begs to be browsed in office or commute, and it'll make a great grad gift. Truly, "Note to Self" is a book you'll pay attention to.

# Can Black Lightning spark your interest?

L.A. Williams: I love superheroes. And I love black folks. So, as a kid in the 70s, when the Black Lightning comic book series debuted, I could hardly contain myself. A black hero glowing with crackling energy? How cool! It could be even better than Black Panther!!

Turned out....not so much.

Please understand, it pained me NOT to like the Black Lightning comic.

But I didn't.

The series was quickly cancelled in the '70s. A '90s revival had terrific art, but not much else, and got canceled again. Then the character floated around the DC Comics universe. A guest appearance here. A mini-series there. A member of this team book...that got cancelled. A member of that team book...who exits when a new writer takes over the book. Such was his fate. And even worse, in the 90s, Milestone Comics introduced Static, showing how cool a black superhero with electric powers could be!

But nostalgia seems to ramp up in 20 year cycles, and superhero stories going from the page to the screen

are all the rage now, so a new Black Lightning TV series didn't come as a "shock" to

The shock is...it's pretty

Here's some comic back-

Tony Isabella and Trevor Von Eeden in 1977, is DC Comics first starring African-American superhero. Jefferson Pierce grew up on the South-Side of Metropolis (AKA "Suicide Slum"), persevered his way through the ghetto and became an Olympic athlete. Years later, he returns to Suicide Slum as a teacher at the local high school. When a gang called The 100 terrorizes the Slum and murders one of Jefferson's students, he decides to intervene and unleash his inner secret: he's a metahuman with the ability to generate and manipulate electricity. His friend, Peter Gambi, suggests Jefferson remain a teacher by day and become a crime-fighter by night to save the community he loves



ferson's marriage. Now divorced, Jefferson had given up superheroics to reconcile with his wife. But when The 100 threatens Jefferson's family...

LAW: ...Lightning strikes again! Jefferson originally didn't have a family in the Black Lightning comic. (His two daughters were introduced to his mythos 19 and 26 years after his debut.) But his family is the key to the TV show's success. Making Jefferson a family man gives him relatable conflicts that dimensionalize him in a way the comic usually failed to. Additionally, it lets the show appeal to different generations. Older viewers can relate to Jefferson's challenges, music tastes, slang, dress, etc. while younger viewers can relate to either one of his daughters or their friends.

It takes a lot to get audiences to overlook a garish costume, cliché villains, and occasional groan-inducing lines like "Only Black Lightning can save us now!" Luckily, Black Lightning has enough to compensate. There's a great looking and fun cast. A good soundtrack. Interesting dilemmas. The addressing of racism. Twists. And, due to outstanding producers and writers, a surrounding black community that rings

QVW: Overall, this show has an amazing storyline. The action is awesome. Its choreography was a little stiff at first, but they worked the kinks out as the season advanced. His movements give me the sense that he rolled with a guy from Gotham once or twice (hint hint). I like this character because he has abilities strong enough to go toe- to-toe with top tier villains but he chooses to defend his community, where he feels most needed. I understand he's a street level type hero, but I would like for him to face some metahuman threats at some point. Guess we'll just have to stay tuned to find out if that will happen. Black Lightning airs at 9pm Tuesdays on the CW.
